DEAR is a no-kill dog rescue located on Grasunan Farm, which is owned and operated by **Crossdogs Rescue Ministry** in Scotland Neck, NC.

It began in 2004 with a handful of volunteers, and to this day, still operates with the same dedicated dog lovers.

DEAR has rescued over 700 dogs & pups during these years placing them in wonderful homes from Nantucket to Florida.

We currently have 35 dogs on hand for adoption of which about 6 have been with us since the first year.

I would like to take you on a picture tour of DEAR and some of its past activities.


This is our "dog carrier" for taking the dogs for a ride around town. Here, we are giving some 4-H'ers a little fun.

This shows some of the dogs in the transport van. This does not look good, but in just a few hours, these dogs will be in loving homes.





The remaining pictures will show some of the more unusual dogs we have taken in over the years and some of our "hall of fame" dogs.




This is a greyhound that was found roaming around. We placed him with greyhound rescue in Raleigh, NC.

Ozzie was rescued from a family that was unable to keep him any longer. A wonderful local home was found for him.




Moonshine was a beautiful dog rescued in highway 258 in Scotland Neck. He, too, has a good home now.




This is Skinny shown in the condition in which we found her.

That is when rescuing is difficult.




Look at Diesel now !!!!!!!!!! He does not look like the same dog.

What a wonderful pit bull !!!!




This is "prison mama" and some of her pups. She was on "death row" at the local dog pound when we rescued her.

This is what I like!!




Rocky is one of our **hall of fame** dogs. Not a very pretty dog, but just a wonderful one. He found a home in Norfolk, Va.

One day I was feeding the dogs when I gave her a dog bone to eat. I did not know it, but she laid down in front of my car. I ran over her and killed her. That destroyed me. She is buried in my special dog cemetery. That's when being in the dog rescue business hurts.



Barney is a success story. Found on the Roanoke River highway 258 bridge, he was brought to us by a friend. After a short stay, Barney found a home all the way up on Nantucket Island. The last we heard he was doing great at a winery.



Taco was a wonderful dog taken in on my farm from a young Mexican boy when he had to return to Mexico due to his mother's death. Taco was a huge dog full of playful love. Sadly, he died of cancer.

He was a lot if fun !!!



Last but not lease, is Art. He was the first pit bull we rescued. Found in Scotland Neck, Art was an immediate hit. There was not a bad bone in his body. He found a good home with a returning Marine from Iraq - a win-win for dog and man.
